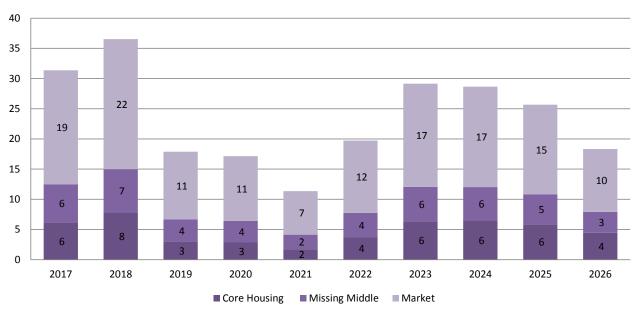

In January 2016, Cranbrook's Homeless Outreach Program estimated that there were a minimum of 111 'absolute' homeless living in the community. The table below provides a cost estimate of the investment required to adequately house those individuals who are episodically or chronically homeless.
