This table shows the number of renter households in the region that are currently in need of a new unit or income support in order to be adequately and affordably housed.

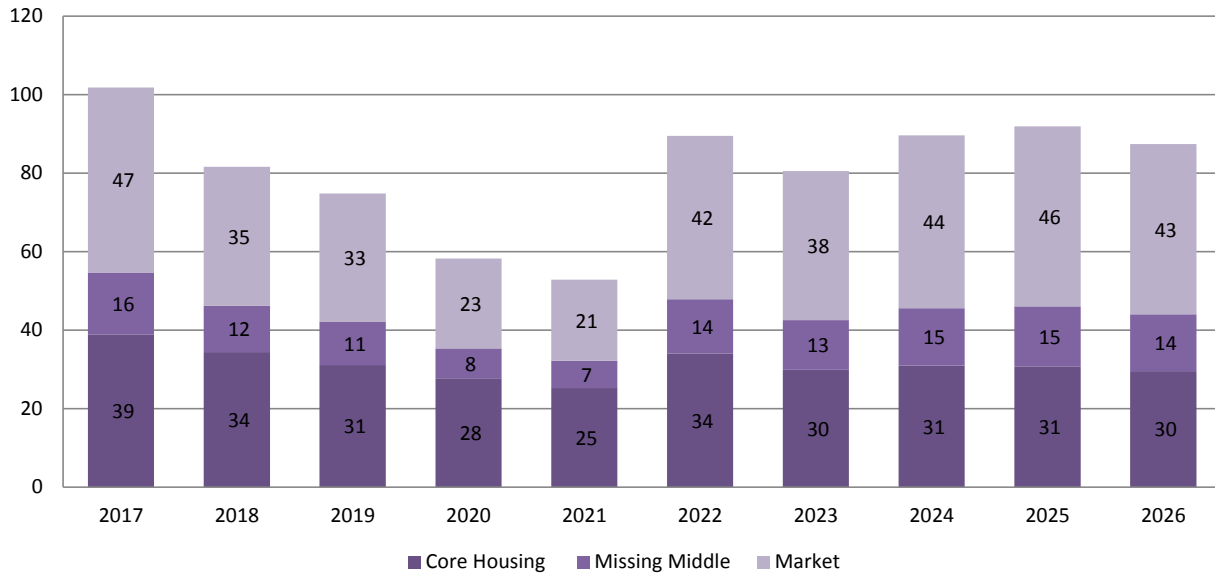

Demand for Affordable Rental Housing

Saving our Current Stock

The figures below show the capital investment needed per year to bring the social housing stock with operating agreements in Thompson-Nicola Regional District up to 'good' condition. This number is derived from building condition assessments conducted by BC Housing.

There are also an estimated **366** units requiring repair in the private market.

Addressing Homelessness

In October 2014, a Point in Time Count took place in Kamloops which enumerated the minimum number of individuals who were experiencing homelessness in the community October 16th to 17th. The table below provides a cost estimate of the investment required to adequately house those individuals who are episodically or chronically homeless.
